2022 was another year of change for Children with Cancer UK as we continue to evolve and leave COVID-19 in the past. Building on the inspirational 35-year legacy of our Founder and Chairman, Eddie O'Gorman, we're more determined than ever to improve outcomes for children and young people with a cancer diagnosis. With Jo Elvin leading as CEO, we are driving forwards with new initiatives and a refreshed strategy. Her expertise will be an asset to our team as we continue to fund essential and groundbreaking research.



Looking forwards, Children with Cancer UK will be focusing on the wellbeing of families facing a childhood cancer diagnosis and how we can best support this. We continue to fund the inspiring Beads of Courage UK programme and have also begun plans for a new wellness centre that will act as a haven for young families.

Finally, I would like to sincerely thank our staff who are the heart of our organisation and the supporters who have been on this journey with us and continue to help the charity support families facing the unimaginable.

Welcome from our **Chief Executive**

It's been a year of seismic transition at Children with Cancer UK. In the last 35 years, this charity has raised £300million to give to the fight against childhood cancers. It's my aim to amplify our message and reach even more audiences than ever before. Children With Cancer UK is proud to be one of the biggest funders of research into childhood cancer in this country and in the past year we have invested £4 million into new projects.

Through a brilliant collaboration with Bone Cancer Research Trust. we committed to funding a Ewing Sarcoma Research programme as no new treatments have been developed for this type of bone cancer in over 30 years, a shocking amount of time. We also provided financial support for the Postdoctoral Fellowship Programme by the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) as the training of earlycareer scientists is crucial for the future of childhood cancer research worldwide. Over the next 12 months, I'm delighted to announce that the charity will be making a major investment in a new worldleading research facility, the Birmingham Cancer Research Institute (BCRI), in collaboration with Birmingham University.

This is the charity's first ever investment in a capital project and it is one that we have full confidence in being able to accelerate the breakthroughs needed in childhood cancer research.

Our new logo features two 'arms' on either side of our name, symbolic of the embrace in which we want to hold all children and their families facing cancer. Long time supporters will already be aware of our ongoing support of the oncology arm of the Beads of Courage UK programme.

This exceptional organisation rewards children with a special bead to represent every treatment they face on their journey and I've seen firsthand the profound impact these beads have on the emotional wellbeing of a child. It's why we're also delighted to be partnering with Spread a Smile. Our support of this wonderful charity means that more children, across the UK, will have the chance to experience happiness alongside the hardship of the hospital ward, as entertainers and therapy animals literally spread smiles wherever they go. In another first for the charity, we are currently developing a holiday retreat in picturesque Yorkshire for the latter half of 2024.

The retreat will give deserving families some much needed holiday time in an environment equipped for the specific needs of children with cancer.

Together with our new branding, we are working to spread our message to new audiences in innovative new ways. We have some big, at times daunting goals we've set ourselves at Children with Cancer UK. But it's also incredibly exciting to think that after 35 years, there is still so much potential for this charity to grow its impact on children and young people. I very much appreciate your continuing support in these efforts.

The difference we made in 2022

Pioneering cancer research

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to have a significant impact on research in the UK but despite these limitations, we funded 4 new research projects worth £3.9 million which means that we are now funding a total of 46 projects, worth over £14 million across the UK and abroad.



£3.75 million invested in collaboration projects with two charities.

- £1 million to Bone Cancer Research Trust for the Ewing Sarcoma Research Programme Grant.
- £2.75 million to Cancer Research UK for SMPaeds 2 for the advancement of precision medicine for children and young people whose cancer has returned.



£180,000 provided to the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) Fellowship Grant.

The training of early-career scientists plays an important role in strengthening the capacity of countries in the fight against cancer.

Vital emotional and practical support

Children with Cancer UK is committed to being there for families through treatment and beyond. As we re-build our wellbeing and support programme, we were able to provide some special memories in 2022 and continue to focus on activities that include the whole family.



186 families took part in one of our activities.


With many childhood cancer patients having brothers and sisters, we are working with Beads of Courage UK to set up a sibling beads programme that allows them to also participate with their own collection.

Funding life-saving research projects

Around 1,800 children and 2,400 young people are diagnosed with cancer each year in the United Kingdom. Whilst over 80% of patients survive, cancer remains one of the leading disease related causes of death for children under 15 years of age.

Children with Cancer UK plays a major role in funding vital life-saving research. We are dedicated to improving survival rates across all types of childhood cancer, improving the quality of life in young cancer survivors, and finding less-toxic treatment options.

In November 2022, we committed £2.75 million to Cancer Research UK to support the Stratified Medicine Paediatrics 2 programme in 2023. This programme aims to develop and study novel tests (investigations) that will build upon the success of StratMedPaediatrics, the UK's first National Molecular Tumour profiling platform for relapsed childhood cancer. We look forward to seeing the results of this collaboration.

We also supported several conferences including the British Neuro-oncology Society (BNOS) annual meeting and the Bone Cancer Research Trust 3rd International Ewing Sarcoma Research Symposium. These collaborative events during the year help to facilitate innovation and share specialist expertise.

Our funding is helping more children survive cancer and look forward to longer and healthier lives after their treatment has ended.



Scientific Advisory Panel

We are indebted to the members of our Scientific Advisory Panel (SAP) who freely give their time and expertise to help drive forward our fight against cancers affecting children and young people. Research into cancers affecting children and young people is a broad field and we aim to reflect the diversity of the field amongst the membership of panel members.

The interim chair of the Panel for 2022 was Professor Roderick Skinner. In 2023, new Chair, Professor Chris Halsey was appointed.



Research Strategy 2021-2026

Children with Cancer UK is currently in year two of a five-year research strategy. Our research programme is designed to progress our principal aims. First, we wish to develop improved treatments so that more patients are cured with less toxic side effects. Second, we wish to better understand how cancer develops so that one day we may be able to prevent it. 2022 was a year of planning, and we prepared to increase our investments significantly for 2023-2026. To begin this period of growth, we were delighted to restart our annual grant call with a commitment of £2.5 million. We were overwhelmed with the number and quality of applications received and look forward to awarding the successful applicants during 2023.

Advancing precision medicine

Project: SMPaeds2 Grant awarded £2.75 million

The problem

Blood cancer and solid tumours such as brain, muscle, and bone, in children and young people can be difficult to access, diagnose and treat. There remain barriers to the development and availability of precision cancer medicines for children and young people. This is in part due to childhood tumours having fewer genetic changes compared to adult tumours.

Our solution

SMPaeds2 aims to develop and study new tests that will build upon the success of the first phase of the programme, Stratified Medicine Paediatrics (SMPaeds1), which established the UK's first National Molecular Tumour profiling platform for relapsed childhood cancer. Molecular tumour profiling maps the unique changes in the DNA of a person's tumour, giving doctors information to help match the patient to the best treatment or clinical trial for their individual cancer.

The outcome

Within five years, it is hoped that new tests developed by SMPaeds2 will help doctors to detect or even predict childhood cancer relapse earlier, as well as lead to the development of new precision medicines. It could also allow them to monitor how a patient is responding to treatment in-real time, meaning they could change or adapt the individual treatment approach if a treatment isn't working.

New treatment options for Ewing sarcoma patients

Project: Bone Cancer Research Trust Grant awarded: £1 million

The problem

Ewing sarcoma represents approximately 15% of all primary bone cancers and approximately 0.02% of all cancers diagnosed in the UK each year, with a peak of incidence between 10 – 20 years old. Through a chronic lack of research and funding, no new treatments have been developed in over 30 years.

Our solution

In collaboration with the Bone Cancer Research Trust, Children with Cancer UK provided £1 million for a grant call that will have transformational effect on new treatment options for Ewing sarcoma patients.

The outcome

By combining forces, the Bone Cancer Research Trust and Children with Cancer UK hope to bring about a greater interest in Ewing sarcoma research that will accelerate the development of new and kinder treatment options that are so desperately needed. Funding is expected to be awarded by December 2023.





Liberty had a zest for life

Liberty had been struggling with intermittent pain in her lower left leg for over 20 months, particularly at night, which was unfortunately misdiagnosed as growing pains and sports injuries. By the time a correct diagnosis had been made of Ewings sarcoma, the tumour was already nearly 20cm in length.

Liberty rarely complained and just got on with it. She was known to throw on her wig, lashes and make-up and dash out to the next party or next school disco. No matter what was thrown at her Liberty faced it all head on, she was a true warrior princess and heroine in every sense of the word.

Just days from the end of her treatment in August 2017, Liberty sadly discovered

a new lump in her thigh. Emergency scans revealed that not only had the Ewing sarcoma returned, it had spread throughout her lungs, liver and lymph glands. No further treatment options were available and nothing more could be done.

Liberty passed away on 11 October 2017, two weeks after her 14th birthday.

After her passing, Liberty's family spearheaded efforts to raise vital funds for research in Liberty's memory by setting up Liberty's Legacy, a Special Fund of the Bone Cancer Research Trust.

It's every parent's worst nightmare

Theo's story told by his mum, Luisa.

Theo was just a normal healthy threeyear-old boy when in May 2021 he developed an ear infection. I had a gut feeling something was wrong and thankfully my GP listened to my concerns and arranged for a blood test to be done.

The blood test was arranged for three days later and during those three days, Theo started to show many more symptoms. Just three weeks before turning four years old, we went for the blood test and within eight hours of having them done, a phone call from our GP changed our lives forever. They confirmed to us that Theo had B-cell acute lymphoblastic leukaemia and I'll never get over that sick and numb feeling.

For the first six months, Theo was receiving intensive chemotherapy treatment and it was really tough on us all. We are now a year on from diagnosis and things finally feel like they have started to settle down. Theo still has chemotherapy every day at home and attends the hospital once a month for IV chemotherapy and a five-day course of steroids. I'm sure we will forever live in fear.

It is so important to us to raise awareness of this illness and we will most definitely be doing further fundraisers to help all the charities along the way as they have all helped us so much right from the very start.

It normalises his treatment and it's lovely they get to do this and be together at Children with Cancer UK events.

Childhood Cancer Awareness Month

Childhood Cancer Awareness Month (CCAM) is a national awareness campaign that occurs every September. This year, we continued the theme of 'When I grow up...' and created two videos with childhood cancer patients Eve and Josh. Eve's inspirational video with Dame Arlene Phillips, our ambassador, was submitted at the Smiley Charity Film Awards in March 2023 and came third in its category. With special thanks to Josh, Eve and their families for sharing their experiences so generously and thank you to Duna Films for helping us to

The season of giving

Our 2022 Christmas Appeal shared Florie's story and the difficulties her family faced over the previous two Christmases. Florie was diagnosed with a Wilms tumour, a type of kidney cancer when she was just two years old. We partnered with 'The Sun on Sunday's Xmas Cards for Kids' campaign and had our designs featured in 790 Tesco UK stores. We received £20,000 as a donation from these sales and were included in their online articles.

"There are so many people we would like to thank."

Florie's Story told by her mum, Emma.

Our two-year-old daughter had been rather miserable for a few weeks, not sleeping at all well, crying in pain at night and off her food. She also had a strange swelling which had appeared on her right side of her abdomen. The doctor took one look at the strange new bulge on our daughter's side and told me she would need immediate surgery.

They told me that our perfect, beautiful Florie had cancer, probably a Wilm's tumour or kidney cancer. I felt numb. I couldn't process what they'd told me. I was alone with my daughter as COVID-19 restrictions had just begun and only one parent was allowed.

My husband and I did 48-hour shifts to be by her side and also care for our other daughter at home. The amazing surgeon and his team removed her right kidney and 80% of the tumour. Florie spent many weeks on the wards receiving endless medication, x-rays, scans and further operations.

I will never forget the extraordinary doctors who made swift decisions and saved her life many times. We are obviously beyond grateful that she has survived the ordeal but do live in fear that it will come back.
